

ferent universities. The fellowships are to be administered by the individual universities and will cover tuition plus an annual allowance of \$1800. Fellowships in physics have been granted to the following schools: Columbia, Cornell, Harvard (2), Princeton, and Yale Universities and the Universities of Chicago and Illinois.

Hughes Aircraft Company has awarded postgraduate fellowships to 136 physics and engineering students who will take advanced courses at five universities while working part time at one or another of the company's five plants in California and Arizona. Hughes is also sponsoring 15 fellowships in science and engineering for doctoral students who will spend part of the year working in the company's research laboratories.

The Eugene Higgins Scientific Trust has allocated \$1.56 million to finance basic research in natural and physical science at Columbia, Yale, Princeton, and Harvard Universities.

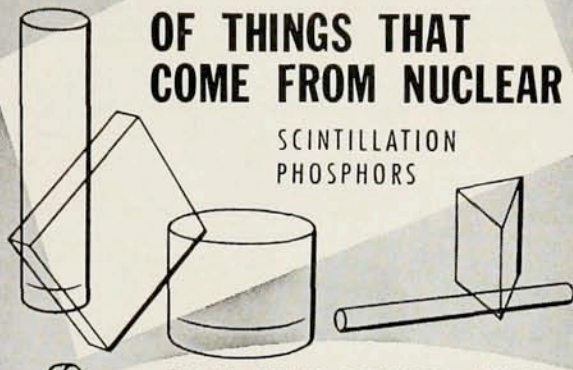
