tended "(1) to provide an appreciation and understanding of the importance of sound in all its aspects in the life of man among the widest possible audience, and (2) to provide practical information on the uses and control of sound unencumbered by the heavy mathematical analysis of the conventional research paper. . . . We want to satisfy the curiosity of the man who wants to know something of the sonar used by the porpoise, as well as the practical needs of the man who has to silence a noisy machine."

The first volume of a new bimonthly journal aimed at providing a common forum for scientists working in various phases of solar-system research has been scheduled for release during 1962 by Academic Press Inc., 111 Fifth Avenue, New York 3, N. Y. Entitled Icarus: International Journal of the Solar System, the new periodical will be edited by Z. Kopal of the Department of Astronomy at Manchester University in England and A. G. Wilson of the Rand Corporation's Planetary Sciences Department in Santa Monica, Calif.

All aspects of the physics, astronomy, and chemistry of the solar system, including work on planets, comets, meteorites, solar-planetary relationships, and interplanetary fields and matter, will be represented in the journal through contributed papers, invited review articles on special topics, and a bibliography consisting of references for currently published research in the field with abstracts for the more important papers.

Subscription prices have been set at \$18 per year for institutions and \$10 for individuals; inquiries regarding them should be addressed to the publishers.

Information Services

A new series of publications sponsored by the National Science Foundation will examine the major scientific publications, research facilities, and information services of selected countries of the world. The series, under the general title, "International Science Information Studies", is intended to overcome some of the obstacles to scientific communication posed by distances, languages, and different cultural developments.
