## Physics Organizations Abroad

The American Institute of Physics published last month the 1962 edition of its Information Booklet on Physics Organizations Abroad. The first edition, issued in May 1961, was designed to furnish American physicists traveling abroad with the names and addresses of major physics centers in other countries. The present edition, considerably longer and more comprehensive, also serves as a desk reference which will facilitate correspondence between physicists in this country and abroad. While the booklet does not attempt complete coverage of physics establishments and personnel outside of the United States, it supplies information about facilities in most of Western Europe, as well as in the Soviet Union and several countries in South America, Asia, Africa, and the Middle East.

## Journals

North-Holland Publishing Co. commenced publication of its new international journal, Physics Letters, on April 1, stating that the journal's aim is "to publish rapidly brief accounts of recent developments in physics, thus complementing for physicists outside the United States the services provided by Physical Review Letters for United States physicists". The new periodical will appear twice each month, is intended to cover all fields of physics, and will accept articles in English, French, or German. The editors are G. E. Brown of Nordita (Copenhagen) and D. ter Haar of the Clarendon Laboratory (Oxford). The international character of the journal is further emphasized by the composition of its board of editorial advisors, which is made up of 62 members representing 25 countries. (Board members in the United States include H. Y. Fan, J. G. Daunt, L. Grodzins, R. L. Mössbauer, O. Piccioni, R. J. Seeger, and J. H. Van Vleck.)

The subscription price has been set at \$10 per volume (about 360 pages). Additional information can be obtained from North-Holland Publishing Co., P. O. Box 103, Amsterdam, Netherlands.

Consultants Bureau of New York City has announced the launching of a new journal containing complete English translations of technical papers published in the USSR which report the results of Soviet satellite and rocket flights. The original papers are published as a continuing series by the Soviet Academy of Sciences, with contributions on topics ranging from satellite instrumentation, guidance, detection, and communications to material on the various physical experiments conducted by means of satellites and rockets.

The new English translation journal, entitled Artificial Earth Satellites, begins with Volumes 7 and 8 of the Russian series—Volumes 1-6 having been produced in book form by Plenum Press, a subsidiary of Consultants Bureau. Volumes 7-12 will appear as three issues of the English journal, and thereafter six volumes will constitute an annual subscription (\$75 domestic, \$80 foreign). It is anticipated that all issues of the new journal will be made available within four months of receipt of the original Russian texts. The archival Bulletin of the Philosophical Society of Washington was established in 1874 and completed its fifteenth volume in 1910. Its publication was suspended during the more than fifty years that followed, and the Society's proceedings and some of its lectures were published in the Journal of the Washington Academy of Sciences. In 1960 the Journal ceased to be an archival publication and the Philosophical Society decided to resume the publication of its Bulletin. Volume 16, Number 1 of the Bulletin accordingly was issued in April of this year under the editorship of François N. Frenkiel of the Applied Mathematics Laboratory at the David Taylor Model Basin.

According to present plans, the revived Bulletin will appear at irregular intervals, and hope has been expressed that an annual issue will include the Society's Presidential and Joseph Henry Lectures, as well as its proceedings and a current directory of the membership.
