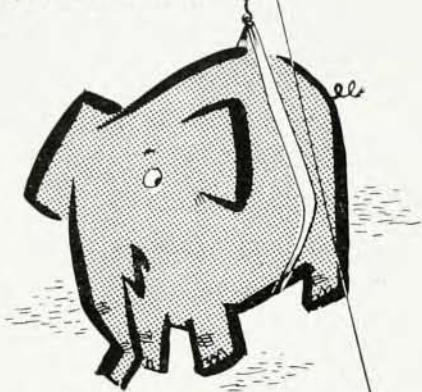


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WHEREABOUTS

Brookhaven National Laboratory has added several new staff members to its physics department. These include CHARLES P. BAKER, formerly of Cornell and Los Alamos; CHARLES C. DAMM and E. C. FOWLER, both of whom were most recently at Harvard; A. C. HUNTING of Swarthmore; D. A. KLEINMAN, a research fellow from Brown University; WILLIAM RATE of Syracuse University, and STANLEY H.
