Shoaf named deputy executive secretary

Mary La Salle Shoaf has been appointed deputy executive secretary of the American Physical Society. On leave from West Chester State College in Pennsylvania, Shoaf has been serving on the APS staff since June (see PHYSICS TODAY, August, page 65).

Shoaf is chairman of the joint APS-AAPT Committee on Science Education for the General Public, a member of the APS Committee on Education, the Committee on the Status of Women in Physics, the Washington area Member Advisory Committee, the Forum on Physics and Society, and the AAPT Council on Physics Education.

At West Chester State College Shoaf has served as chairman of the faculty senate, as acting chairman of the department of physics, and on various standing and ad hoc committees. She received her PhD at Purdue University in 1960.

The office of the deputy executive secretary is filled at the discretion of the executive secretary. One of the recommendations of the report of the

Committee on the Future of the APS called for the reinstatement of this position to relieve the heavy administrative load that has come about with the growth of the Society.

the annual dues, although they are not required to do so. Besides merely voting for the programs they felt deserving of support, members were given the option of making a special voluntary contribution in support of proposed new programs.

The table below is based on a sample of invoices returned by mid-December. Forty-two percent of the members in the sample paid the normal voluntary contribution, 2.8% paid a special voluntary contribution in addition to the normal voluntary contribution and 4.2% paid a special voluntary contribution in lieu of the normal voluntary contribution.

APS logo competition initiated by Council
