Contribute your film to the AAPT contest

The American Association of Physics Teachers is sponsoring a film competition to stimulate production of short (four minutes or less) single-concept physics films in regular or super-8 mm format. The competition will be held in February during AAPT's joint annual meeting with the American Physical Society in New York City. The competition is open to physics students and teachers who have not produced films for commercial distribution.

Content and concept will be the primary judging criteria; photographic expertise is secondary, and films submitted by students will be evaluated separately from those of teachers. Entries (no more than three per contestant) must be postmarked by 21 November. Cash awards for winning films are expected but not yet confirmed. 
