Council establishes two new prizes

Two new prizes will be awarded by the APS in 1979. The Frank Isakson Prize has been established to "recognize and encourage outstanding contributions to the field of optical effects in solids." This prize will consist of \$3000, a travel allowance for transportation to the awards ceremony and a certificate citing the contribution made by the recipient.

Five Isakson prizes will be awarded in even-numbered years as a memorial to Frank Isakson, who died in December 1977 after serving as head of the physics branch of the Office of Naval Research. The international prize will be supported with funds remaining from the three International Photoconductivity Conferences that were held largely on Isakson's initiative. Names of potential candidates for this prize can be sent to Elias Burstein, Department of Physics, University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, Pennsylva-

The APS has also announced a new Fluid Dynamics Prize for "major contributions to fundamental fluid dynamics made during a career of outstanding work in the US." This prize will also consist of \$3000, a travel allowance and a citation certificate, and was established with support from the Office of Naval Research.
