Survey of universities finds few women on senior staff

The underrepresentation of women physicists on the faculties of major universities is shown clearly in the recent "Survey Compiled for the APS Committee on the Status of Women in Physics" by Laura Eisenstein (University of Illinois) and Elizabeth Baranger (University of Pittsburgh). This survey lists the numbers of women and men on faculties of departments offering a PhD in physics. It was compiled using the AIP "1980–1981 Director of Physics and Astronomy Staff Members".

The survey includes only those faculty members with the rank of Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, or Professor who are listed as full-time or part-time in physics. Excluded are lecturers, research professors, professor emeriti, and so forth. Persons listed as full-time in areas other than physics or part-time in two areas other than physics have also been excluded.


The results are that "in the 171 departments surveyed, there are 4176 faculty who fit the above description. Of these, 79 are women." The table shown lists the 46 physics departments granting PhDs that had at least one woman as Professor or Associate Professor when the survey was compiled. The remaining 125 departments had no woman on their senior physics faculty.

The APS responds

The survey prepared for the APS Committee on the Status of Women in Physics highlights the serious lack of women on the physics faculties of PhDgranting institutions. In a letter that Arthur L. Schawlow, then APS President, sent in October 1981 to the University Presidents of each of the 171 departments that grant PhDs in physics, he expressed the concern of the APS Council about the "underrepresentation of women in the profession of physics" and especially "the lack of women among the senior physics faculty members of PhD-granting institutions.'

Schawlow's letter emphasized that the primary initiative to improve this situation must come from the academic

community, but offered APS assistance to help identify potential women candidates for senior faculty positions in physics. This assistance would be provided by the newly formed APS Panel on Faculty Positions for Women Physicists consisting of Ralph O. Simmons (Chairman), Univ. of Illinois; Elizabeth U. Baranger, Univ. of Pittsburgh; Herman Feshbach, M.I.T.; Judy R. Franz, Indiana Univ.; James A. Krumhansl, Cornell Univ.; Neal F. Lane, Rice Univ.; Mary L. Shoaf, Princeton Univ.; Sandra Slivinsky, General Electric Company; and Joseph A. Burton, American Physical Society.

Responses from the university community are now arriving and the work of the new panel is underway. Ralph Simmons, as panel chairman, encourages university physics departments to inform the panel of anticipated openings in their senior physics faculty, and also invites inquiries and suggestions from qualified women physicists who may be interested.
