

Corporations sponsor APS scholarships for minority students

The APS Selection Committee, headed by Charles E. Bush of Oak Ridge, has chosen the 18 winners of Corporate Sponsored Scholarships for Minority Undergraduate Students in Physics for 1982. Now in its third year, this program is intended to increase the level of minority participation in physics in the US. Each scholarship is sponsored by a corporation and consists of \$2000 awarded to the student and \$500 awarded to the host physics department.

Six of these scholarships were awarded to new recipients and 12 are renewals for the 1982-1983 academic year. The new recipients are listed with the name of the winner, the school that nominated them, the corporate sponsor and the host college: Mona J.
