► Each student nominee will be granted a free APS Student Membership for one year upon receipt of the completed

application.

Nominations for the 1985 Apker Award are open to students at colleges or universities in the United States who were enrolled as undergraduates during at least a part of the 12-month period preceding the 15 June 1985 deadline. Only one candidate may be nominated by an institution. The candidate should have completed the requirements for an undergraduate degree with an excellent academic record and should have demonstrated exceptional potential for scientific research by an original contribution to physics.

The applications should include: a letter of nomination from the head of the physics department; a copy of the student's academic transcript; documentation written by the student, including a 1000-word summary describing the original contribution to physics submitted for this award, such as a research publication or senior thesis; and two letters of recommendation from physicists who know the candidate's individual contribution to the work submitted. The deadline for completed applications is 15 June 1985.

The Selection Committee, to be headed in 1985 by Robert E. Marshak (Virginia Polytechnic Institute), will review the applications and select the winner from among four finalists invited for interviews in September or

October.

Council increases APS dues and confirms expanded benefits

The APS Council at its meeting on 28 October 1984 passed a motion to increase APS dues from \$30 to \$40 effective at the beginning of the next APS fiscal year, 1 July 1985.

The APS bylaws require that "a motion to change the dues shall be passed at two successive meetings of Council. An announcement of such a motion by Council shall appear in an issue of the Bulletin published before the second vote is taken." The Council will consider this motion again at its meeting on 20 January 1985 as announced there.

The motion passed by Council reads as follows: "Resolved: That the Annual Dues for APS Regular Members and Fellows be increased from \$30 to \$40

effective 1 July 1985."

No change is proposed for the special \$10 student membership rate in Fiscal Year 1986. Bills sent to members will continue to solicit a \$10 voluntary contribution over and above regular dues. Members will receive automatically and free of charge Physics Today, the Bulletin, The APS Membership Directory and the AIP Directory of Physics and Astronomy Staff Members. On request, members are also entitled to receive, free of charge, Physical Review Abstracts and General Physics Advance Abstracts.
